### Shalom Ramah Wisconsin Committee,

Adina and I regularly report to you about the special thirst for Ramah we continue to uncover in the smallest Jewish communities in our region. We know that these communities belie the simple stereotypes of Jewish - and even generally American - life outside the major metropolises. Yet most of the time we are only able to drop-in for a day mid-week, watching Hebrew school happen and meeting with some families in the shul or a family's living room.

The last two years, at the strong request of a charismatic new Rabbi at Tifereth Israel in Des Moines and with the support of grant from the Conservative/Masorti Fund, Adina and I have benefited from a new perspective on that community in a way that is far more organic and illuminating. This past Shabbat we held our second-annual Ramah



Shabbaton at Tifereth Israel; while Adina was in Jerusalem celebrating Shabbat with alumni from last year's mishlachat and American staff studying in Israel for the year, veteran staff Shira Forester and Arielle Small joined me for the weekend in Des Moines. Our relationship with Tifereth Israel runs strong and deep. Thanks to the vision and generosity of the Pomerantz Family and the long-time stewardship of the Rabinowitz Family, there is significant financial support available to help families get to Ramah. Through the tenures of Rabbi Barry Cytron and Rabbi Neil Sandler, and aided for decades by the passionate advocacy of Roselind Rabinowitz, a significant number of campers have ventured to Conover for life-changing experiences. After moving through a fallow period, Rabbi Barton has dedicated herself to reinvigorating the entire community, with a specific focus on engaging children and young families.

After four separate flight cancellations (yup - 3 people, 4 cancellations), Shira and I road-tripped from O'Hare to Des Moines on Friday, where we met up with Arielle. We were welcomed by Rabbi Emily Barton, about eighteen-months into an exuberant and dynamic rabbinate that is already transforming the community.

Rabbi Barton gave us a tour of the synagogue, newly renovated and modernized about ten years ago, and packed with more than one hundred years of history. Original Warhols and Lasanskys adorn the walls in the atrium; glass-walled classrooms and an impressive, up-to-date library ring the atrium. Rabbi Barton planned our Shabbaton to coincide with a visit by an artist-in-residence, Eliana Light, who is also a member of the Ramah Wisconsin family as a former Rosh Tefillah and ongoing member of our Family Camp staff. Eliana is an extraordinarily talented musician and educator, as comfortable leading services for tots as she is teaching theology and sharing her original music that is deeply in dialogue with traditional


### **BAR MITZVAH ANNOUNCEMENT**

### Dear Rabbi Barton.

When I go grocery shopping, I'm not always sure if the symbols on the front of a package or can mean that the food is kosher or if it means something else. Are there different kosher symbols? Why? If so, what's the difference and how do I know what all of them are? Sincerely, Lost in the Aisles

### Dear Lost,

I'm glad you're looking at packaged food so carefully, it's always good to know what's in your food, whether or not you keep kosher! There are often lots of symbols on a packaged food item, and your guess is correct: sometimes the symbols on the package have nothing to do with whether or not the item is kosher, for example an "R" with a circle around it means registered trademark, not anything having to do with kosher. However, there are also many different kosher symbols. Some kosher symbols are more familiar, like a "U" with a circle around it (often called OU), which denotes that the Orthodox Union, an organization of Orthodox Rabbis and congregations, certifies that the food is Kosher. cRc which comes from the Chicago Rabbinical Council. At the end of my answer, I have a picture of most of the kosher symbols that are more popular, but there is even a symbol for certified kosher products from


Uruguay!

Since kosher laws require keeping meat and dairy separate, kosher products always specify whether or not they are meat or dairy or pareve (containing neither meat nor dairy). Usually next to the symbol there will be "meat" or "d" for dairy. If there is nothing, then the item is usually pareve. Do note, though, that even if an item does not actually contain any meat or dairy ingredients, it can still get this designation if it is produced on equipment designated for meat or dairy. Foods certified as kosher for Passover get a separate label that says "kosher for Passover" or "kasher l'Pesach." A "P" next to a kosher symbol usually means that it is kosher for

Passover and not that it is pareve.

Another thing that is important to clarify is how something gets to be kosher and why there are all these different symbols. In order for something to be certified kosher, or receive a kosher stamp (known as a "hechshur"-pronounced HECK-SURE) a rabbi or kosher supervision organization has to come in and supervise the production of the food making sure that the food is made according to kosher food laws. The general public often has a misconception that it means a rabbi "blessed" the food. In a way, the rabbi gave the food his/her blessing, but not in the way most non-Jews think, instead by making sure there is nothing forbidden for Jews in the food (including, in the case of fresh fruits and vegetables forbidden insects, of which there are many). There are so many different symbols because there are many (mostly Orthodox) organizations that do this. It is in many ways a business, and just like with any business, there are some that you may trust more than others. This has more to do with how often they come to visit the facility, etc. It can also be expensive to get your food certified kosher, so some companies may just not want to pay for the supervision, even if they have nothing at their facility that is forbidden (ingredient-wise) for Jews. If you're concerned about a product, you can usually call the company and ask. We have done that before if something is certified vegan but not kosher.

Well, I hope this is helpful even if it is probably more information than you bargained for!





Alpha radiation startup eliminates 70% of cancerous tumors. Now going into clinical trials for specific types of cancer, Alpha Tau's technology shows potential for treating any solid tumor.

A breakthrough Israeli technology that eliminates cancerous tumors in 70 percent of cases was nearly lost in bureaucracy and university politics. Fifteen years ago, Professors Yona Keisari and Itzhak Kelson of Tel Aviv University discovered a way

to use alpha radiation to destroy tumors. Their approach was revolutionary – alpha radiation is so powerful it can snap both strands of a cancer cell's DNA, but it won't harm surrounding healthy tissue as other types of radiation do.

However, alpha radiation can't travel more than about 50 microns (1/20 of a millimeter) inside human tissue. Treating a tumor of, say, 5cm would require hundreds of thousands of short ranged alpha-emitting sources – a seeming impossibility.

Keisari and Kelson discovered that, when delivered via a particular isotope of the element radium, alpha radiation can travel as far as 3mm. The isotope, Radium 224, releases atoms that diffuse inside a tumor and then emit their own alpha particles. This approach enables the much farther distribution of alpha particles to kill entire tumors.

The professors and Tel Aviv University patented the technology in 2003. More research was conducted and 12 peer-reviewed papers were published. But squabbling between the various stakeholders over the intellectual property kept their breakthrough in limbo until 2015 when Uzi Sofer was recruited to sort things out.

Sofer had an impressive track record in medical technology. He previously cofounded and served as CEO of Brainsway, which develops treatments using transcranial magnetic stimulation (TMS) for depression, PTSD, OCD and other brain disorders and addictions. The company grew under his leadership from two to 70 employees.

Realizing what the professors had, Sofer formed a new company – Alpha Tau (the "Tau" stands for Tel Aviv University) – to further develop the technology. Earlier this year Alpha Tau raised \$29 million from Shavit Capital,

Medison Ventures and OurCrowd.

Stimulates immune system

Alpha Tau is the only company to use alpha radiation to treat solid tumors. All other types of brachytherapy (where a sealed radiation source is placed inside or next to the area requiring treatment) use beta or gamma radiation.

"But that only causes a single-strand break in the DNA, from which the cell can recover," Sofer explains. "And it's not as focused. As a result, it causes a lot of side effects and destroys healthy tissue."

When the healthy tissue around the tumor is not destroyed along with the cancer, the immune system is stimulated to recognize and attack the same type of tumors elsewhere in the body. These kinds of metastases are the cause of death for 85% of cancer patients.

"We believe that DaRT technology has tremendous clinical value not only in destroying the tumor but preventing cancer from spreading to other organs," Sofer says.

### **Clinical trials**

Thousands of animal studies have been done on the company's Alpha DaRT ("Diffusing Alpha-Emitters Radiation Therapy") technology.

The first human trials of Alpha DaRT have been taking place in Israel and Italy for squamous cell carcinoma (SCC) tumors, a form of skin and head and neck cancer.

Further clinical trials of DaRT for all types of skin cancer (Cutaneous and Mucosal malignant Neoplasia – CMN) are planned for 2019 and will take place in Israel, Italy, France, New York and Montreal.

Trials for other indications are currently in process and expected to be initiated in the next 3-6 months in Montreal and New York, US (pancreatic and skin cancer), Obninsk, Russia (breast cancer), Cambridge, UK (vulvar) and Israel (prostate cancer). Additional trials will later be initiated for more than 20 other indications – such as cervical, renal and colon cancer – at medical centers in more than 25 countries.

"Once approved by the regulatory authorities, we can treat any kind of solid tumor," Sofer tells ISRAEL21c, "including cancers where there is no other chance and this is a patient's last chance to live."

Pancreatic cancer, for example, today has no cure; patients usually die within five years of diagnosis. Alpha

Tau's DaRT "seeds" may be able to flip that prognosis.

"In our SCC studies, we were able to eliminate more than 70 percent of the tumors entirely and to cause shrinkage of 100 percent of the tumors," Sofer says. "Encouraged by these promising results, we hope to eliminate pancreatic tumors as well or to shrink them so that it will be possible to remove them surgically."

### Personalized treatment kits

Despite the power of alpha radiation, it's actually safer than conventional beta or gamma treatments.

"You don't need so much radioactivity to get the same effect," Sofer explains. "We can ship our treatment kit to hospitals almost in regular boxes. Patients can be treated in an outpatient setting with no radioactive shielding."

After less than a week, 50% of the alpha radiation will already be gone from the body. In two weeks, there will be no radioactivity left at all.

However, once a DaRT kit is assembled (for example, a patient with breast cancer might need 12 needle applicators with 6 DaRT seeds in each) it must be sent to the treatment facility fast.

"If for some reason a patient doesn't come on time, the

next day you'll need to put the whole kit in the trash," Sofer says.

Because of DaRT's fast decay, Alpha Tau will need to build production facilities close to the main treatment centers. The first one is already working in Israel. The company has received approval to build a facility in Massachusetts. The third will be in Japan with a fourth in Europe, Sofer says.

Under Sofer's leadership, Alpha Tau now has 26 on staff in Israel, including the professors who invented the core technology. Following clinical testing, Sofer hopes Alpha DaRT will receive its European Union approval by 2020 with the US and Japan coming in 2022.

"We are already saving lives in the trials," he says. "It's amazing to see patients who have been told their life expectancy is in weeks get treatment under local anesthesia and, 60 days out, they're clear, they have no evidence of any tumors. I've been in this business for a while, but this is the best."

### TIS ENTRY KEY FOB INFORMATION

### Additional Security Measure – Congregants to receive Key FOB for entry to Tifereth

In light of the tragedy at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh and other recent anti-Semitic events, the Tifereth board has decided, in conjunction with **Rabbi Barton**, to keep the doors of the building locked at all times. Many of you may have already experienced this new development and we thank you so much for being so supportive of this change in security in the synagogue. In order to address the need of members to come in and out of the building for services, however, the board has also authorized the purchase of key fobs that will allow you to enter the building without having to be buzzed or otherwise let in. Each member family will be able to request up to two key fobs. If you choose not to get a Key FOB, you will be let in to the building when you arrive for services or another event; you will only have to wait for someone to come let you in. At big events, like a bar or bat mitzvah or the High Holidays, there will be security in place at the front door. If you only frequent the synagogue at the High Holidays or for other large events, you may not want to get a key fob at this time.

An order form was sent to each member, to be completed and returned to the Synagogue, so that a Key FOB can be programmed for your worship needs. Once we get your form we will program the FOB and let you know that it is ready for pick-up. If you need an order form, please let the office know.



Jewish sources.

Friday night the synagogue was packed with young families for a kid-friendly Kabbalat Shabbat led by Eliana, followed by a delicious Shabbat dinner. Shira and Arielle reconnected with an alumna of Rochelle Zell Jewish High School while I schmoozed with a number of current and prospective parents. Throughout Shabbat itself Eliana, Shira, Arielle, and I moved in and out of programming opportunities, including my delivering the D'var Torah, Shira and Arielle providing programming and games for over twenty kids all afternoon, more informal conversations about Ramah, and Eliana performing Saturday night after havdalah. During Kiddush lunch I connected with a handful of parents of alumni, sharing fond recollections of their kids' experiences at Ramah in the '90s, the formative impact it still has on their and their children's families, and various stories of journeys to and from Eagle River for visits.

In 2017 we had two campers from Des Moines; in 2018 we had seven; in 2019 we expect roughly the same amount of campers and hope for a cohort at Family Camp, joined by Rabbi Barton.

This community, small and richly textured, lacking certain resources and blessed with many others, vibrant and proud, tells a particular story about Judaism we don't often hear. We were hosted by families who keep kosher and heard congregants kvell over the kosher options now on sale at the local Hy-Vee (another Barton contribution). We heard a lot of Hebrew from Israeli parents committed to passing their linguistic heritage, and much more, down to their children. We saw a professionally and politically diverse Jewish community, one peppered with Ramah alumni and a pulpit Rabbi who sees, and invests in, the value that sending more children to Ramah enhances the community. This weekend left me excited and optimistic for our future.

Having long resisted Shabbat visits to synagogues, Adina's experience last year and mine this past weekend require us to reevaluate how we might expand this model. There is much to be gained and - this is where you, members of our Ramah committee, come in - we can only make it happen with exceptionally strong lay and professional support in a given community. Rabbi Barton's community organizing, vision for the weekend, and relentless recruitment of families made this possible. She is assisted by a number of synagogue members who believe deeply in what we have to offer. As we think about cautiously expanding, and possibly exploring options in the Chicago and Twin Cities area in addition to our smaller communities, we seek additional partners ready to make things happen.




